





What is Autism?

Autism is a complex, lifelong developmental disability that typically appears during early childhood and can impact a person's social skills, communication, relationships, and self-regulation. Autism is defined by a certain set of behaviours and is a "spectrum condition" that affects people differently and to varying degrees. At O' Carolan College, we use an eclectic approach to teaching our students. The eclectic method is a combination of different learning approaches and a variety of specific ASD teaching methodologies, for example, TEACCH, ABA, Social Stories e.t.c. We also use the task analysis approach, a step by step breakdown of the task involved, thus ensuring success for all our students. The use of visual displays is of high importance for our students and an eclectic approach ensures that all of our students are supported to the highest degree.

Any supports provided are at the service's discretion. It **does not** automatically entitle cardholders and or their companions to discounts or preferential treatment over other customers.
